AS A NATURALIZED CITIZEN, YOU CAN REGISTER TO VOTE!

It's important to vote for candidates who care about the things that concern you and your community:

- Immigration
- Family
- Education
- Housing
- Healthcare
- Good jobs

Reading the newspaper, watching the news on tv, asking your immigration attorney for information, and talking with your co-workers and friends can help you learn about candidates' positions on these important policies.

After candidates have been elected to office, you can continue to make a difference. Contact your elected officials (by phone, mail, or email) to let them know your views about policies. Organize with your neighbors and community groups so you have a strong voice on important issues.

REGISTER TO
VOTE AND
MAKE YOUR
VOICE HEARD!

The first step in the voting process is registering to vote. Once you have registered, you are eligible to vote in local, state, and national elections. The Board of Elections will send you a notice before election day, telling you where to vote, and providing you with a voter registration card.

If you move, change your name, or switch party registration, you must re-register to vote. If you want to register with a political party, you may, but it's not a requirement. If you select a party, you can vote in primary elections, helping choose who will run in the general election.

YOU ARE ELIGIBLE TO
REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- you are a United States Citizen
- you are 18 years or older
- you are not serving time for a felony conviction

IMMIGRATION ISSUES AT ALL LEVELS
OF GOVERNMENT

It is important that you vote for your representatives at each level of government. Your city and county governments provide legal services for immigrants, school programs for English classes, and job training assistance. Your state government develops social service policies and determines who is eligible for the benefits. It also sets standards for schools and graduation. The federal government passes immigration laws, funds programs that affect immigrants, and provides funding for schools and language programs.

USE THE POWER OF YOUR VOTE TO
MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

You can educate yourself on issues that concern you and your community. Find out what positions candidates are taking on the things you most care about, and help elect those who agree with your views.

You also can let candidates know what is important to you and your community by voicing your opinions individually or as part of a group. Talk to your friends and associates at church, the supermarket, and school meetings and sports events. Get together and let candidates know about the issues they need to support to get your vote!
